Become a member of our A bittersweet reopening at Burr Oak cemetery Sign In Register BURR OAK CEMETERY | 'It couldn't have been a better day to let me in' Comments November 20, 2009 BY LAUREN FITZPATRICK SouthtownStar Letting the tears flow down her cheeks, Rochelle Briscoe boarded a shuttle bus to Burr Oak Cemetery on Thursday morning with a balloon and a bag of flowers. The timing for the reopening of the scandal-ridden Alsip cemetery couldn't be better, the South Holland woman said. "It's always sad, but it couldn't have been a better day to let me in," she said. Thursday was the birthday of her tall, handsome son Lawrence, who died in 2003 at age 33. And though Briscoe cried for her loss, she was pleased about the improvements she saw at the cemetery, where four former employees are accused of digging up graves to resell plots. "The roads were so raggedy in there, but they fixed them. It's a big improvement," she said, adding she'll keep her plot next to her son's after Four months after Cook County Sheriff Tom Dart announced the destruction of about 200 graves, Burr Oak's heavy new wrought iron gates opened to the public Thursday. Unlike the desperate thousands who showed up at the cemetery in July to make sure their loved ones' graves had not been destroyed in an alleged grave-reselling scandal, a slow trickle of people rode shuttle buses to Burr Oak from a nearby office set up as a help center. Howard Korenthal, a business turnaround consultant named as chief operating officer, and his adviser, Roman Szabelski of Catholic Cemeteries, are reopening the cemetery in sections. "We decided to open this way for families who aren't quite sure where their loved ones' graves are so we can give them a little more attention," Szabelski said. "So far it seems to be working well."
